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#### ALL SET FOR "GET WITH THE STRENGTH"

Everything is set for the running of the "Get With The Strength" Rally on Saturdey 29th and Sunday 30th November. This will be the final round of the 1975 Queensland Rally Championship and the Queensland Recognised Series. An all-weather route has been chosen, and no problems are expected unless very heavy rains fall during the event itself.

The first car will be flagged away from King George Square at three o'clock on Saturday afternoon by Alderman Thomson, Chairman of the City Council Transport and Electricity Committee. I do not believe the sport can exist without sponsorship - and without spectators, sponsors are likely to be harder to come by. Daylight sections are a must for spectating.

Can organisers arrange roped off areas or the like to keep spectators off the outside of corners? It would be in the I interestof both spectators and competitors alike.

While on safety, an optional 3 minute car separation on request, in dusty conditions, without penalty, would be a plus for all concerned. it works well in Western Australia. Why not here?

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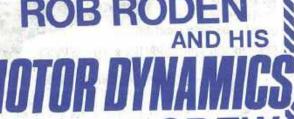
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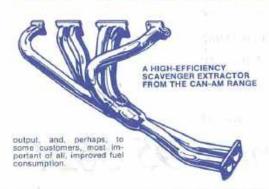
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Yes, this test is on the 'normal' Dolomite, not the Sprint version. However, I hope to have a follow up impression run in a sprint for next issue.

The test car, picked up on Friday morning, was finished in a mid blue, and in my eyes was a very smart looking little car. It also created more interest than any other test car so far, and parking it in the City, as I did on Friday afternoon on a couple of occasions, usually saw at least one onlooker peering through the windows on my return.

The interior of the test car was mainly black, - carpets, seats and doors, nicely set off by the (genuine) wooden dashboard and very comfortable, adjustable steering wheel with padded rim and three alloy spokes. Instruments are clock, temperature gauge, voltmeter, speedometer with trip meter, tachometer (red line from 6,500 r.p.m.), and fuel gauge. There is a veritable Christmas tree of coloured warning lights covering oil pressure, high beam, low fuel, ignition, hand brake, choke, rear window heater and turn indicators.

Dashboard switches are limited to unimportant things like dash light rheostat, rear window heater switch and emergency flasher, while the more important functions are handled by the best set of column control stalks I have ever had the pleasure of using. The pedals are all on the one level and sensibly sized, ventilation is quite good, the short gear lever is handy to reach and incorporates a small overdrive switch on top of the knob, (more on this later) and the seats are quite comfortable. All in all, a very liveable interior.

The engine in the Dolomite is of 1854 c.c., and produces 91 bhp. It is inclined 45 degrees, helping to keep the bonnet line low. Although (I imagine), not up to the performance standard of the Sprint, the Dolomite is no slouch. The owners manual states that 6,000 r.p.m. gives 66, 98 and 139 kph in the first three gears, and there is no reason to disbelieve this. Not being a leadfoot driver, I didn't try to check, but up to 6,000 r.p.m. the engine is very smooth and strong, if a bit noisy from 5,000 onwards.

The electric overdrive which operates on third and fourth gears, was a bit of a mystery at first, and having no automatic cancelling, occasionally left me in the wrong gear. For example, changeing from third O/D back to second, then up to third again without flicking out the switch, lands you back in third O/D again, not direct third. As third O/D and direct fourth are, for all practical purposes the same ratio (3.62 and 3.63), I settled for using the overdrive on fourth only, where it cuts the engine revs considerably and makes for quiet, relaxed cruising. Flicking the switch at 4,000 r.p.m. with some power on brings in overdrive beautifully smoothly, but down 'changes' can sometimes be'a bit jerky.

During my extended time with the Dolomite I covered over 750 km., (at the time of writing this I still have the car, so the total distance is still unknown), and over that distance found very few things to spoil my enjoyment of the car. Two minor grumbles could be quite easily cured - one is not quite good enough headlights - although they are well above average, and the other is inadequate

tyres. Although radials are a standard fitting, they do seem to be a bit suspect at any time, and are quite unsatisfactory in the wet.

The other complaint is a bit harder to explain, and not being very technically minded makes it harder still, however I will do my best. It concerns the suspension, and first showed up as strong nosedive under heavy braking. Later it appeared as 'float' in the front end when negotiating undulating roads at relatively high speed. In particular, if cornering fairly fast, bumps in the corner will move the front off line quite noticeably, thus making quick motoring on anything other than smooth roads less enjoyable than would otherwise be possible. The problem is not as bad as in some other makes I have tested, but was rather disappointing all the same.

Dirt roads and high speeds do not go together very well either, as there is a lot of movement and clunking in the rear end, which was easily thrown off line on bumps. However, the car remains very controllable, and I had a ball exploring the handling on dirt roads. The short front overhang means that a lot of mud and water is thrown onto the headlights and windscreen when negotiating puddles at any decent rate of knots.

The brakes were extremely good. they stood up to all the punishment they received during one stretch where I deliberately used them as hard and as often as possible. Stopping was always smooth and straight until really abused badly when the rear wheels locked first and caused some directional instability, which corrected itself immediately the pressure was eased off.

Overall, I would have to rate the Dolomite as probably the most 'ownable' of test cars to date for my purposes. Looking at the practical, family type usage, there is good rear seat room, adequate though quite shallow, boot, and plenty of interior storage from a lockable glovebox and full width parcel shelf. There is also pockets in the backs of the front seats. Although I am really looking forward to my time with the Sprint, I do not think that I will prefer it over the standard model. (Of course, I have been wrong many times before...)

Overall fuel consumption for this test - which included a couple of short, easy trips, which would help to make the consumption better than the usual results I get, worked out to be 29.45 m.p.g.

This is the sort of figure I would expect to get in this car during my normal, private use.
