### COOLOOLA - A CLASSIC SUCCESS

Could 1997 be the year of the QRC?

After 61 entries were received for round one, the Cooloola Classic on March 1, it seems we're in for a very competitive season, especially given the appearance of 10 cars from the deep north.

Clerk of Course, Brian Everett says he's very pleased with the result, as are Bruce Dummett and Tom Smith, who accepted the winner's laurels after a strong showing in the VR4. (see picture below)

Second was Bruce Fullerton/Rob Reddiex in the Lancer turbo 4wd and third, Dean Tighe and Del Garbett in the Pulsar GTIR.

  - Apart from the strong showing from crews in the Mackay-Townsville region, we had one competitor who travelled from Ballina and a grand total of 16 crews whose drivers were competing in the ARN Junior Challenge.

That's a very good sign for the future of rallying here in the sunshine state.

Apparently numbers in the challenge elsewhere are tapering off and in some cases as few as two or three cars were on hand to contest the first round in some of the southern states. Let's hope they take a leaf from our book by the time they get to round two.

Rain in the week before the event saw excellent rally conditions with minimal dust and plenty of traction. Brian and his team of organisers had done an excellent job preparing a course which included plenty of new roads - something of a bonus for new competitors and old alike.

Positive feedback from competitors means

the new format is likely to remain for 1998 - but already Brian and crew have plans for a couple of show-stopping additions - including a possible display stage with organising help from the Glastonbury rural fire brigade.

Brigade members from the Glastonbury RFB were those cheery souls manning the refreshment stalls and providing road blocks and radio communications on the Brooyar Stage.

Apparantly, the firies are so pleased with the amount of income generated over the weekend, that they plan to take a greater part next year.

Brian says that apart from some minor radio hassles at the start, all went smoothly. The Cooloola was a relaxed affair, although the organisers were forced to start earlier and finish later due to the big field.

Even Sunday's presentation ceremony was well attended.

Brian would like to thank the North Queensland competitors who attended.

He says the strong support by BSCC members for last year's northern QRC round resulted in reciprocal support that was evident at Cooloola.

Clearly, this mutual support is a good thing for competition and for our state championship in particular. BSCC members should have a good look at supporting the Townsville QRC again this year. It is due on July 12 and 13.

Of the northerners, congratulations go to Ross Angelo and Paul Couper who came third in class P2 in their Datsun 120Y. Tony Cameron and Ron Peters came 4th in P3 in their Bluebird and Keith Callinan and Paul Tenant finished 4th in P4.

### MOBY VIC'S CLUBMAN RALLY


This event will be run on Saturday 19th April and

# CAMS manual bumpf

Bureaucracy lives! Now that the 1997 CAMS manual has been out and about for a month, Pat Hetherman has discovered some interesting rules.

- 1. Page 13-8 regarding motorkhanas, the Manual states at item 1-2 that vehicles "shall have road wheels of not less than 2450mm" According to Pat, that's about 2.4 metres or more than eight feet! Pat suggests this rule should lead to chaos at the first event scrutiny. Those weird motorkhana specials are going to get even weirder.
- 2. Page 11-42 refers to rally sprints. With a course length of up to 8km and two separate stages that can be run in either direction, Pat reports that each can be run up to three times. According to Pat's calculator, 8x2x2x3 = 96 and that means that in 1997, a Rallysprint can be longer than a clubman rally!
- 3. Page 11-42 also refers to clothing under item 7.1. Pat is concerned to read that drivers are required to wear "apparel of non-flammable material". What do they suggest Teflon underwear? Pat hasn't heard of any material that is truly non-flammable.

Without checking through boxes of archives and relying on memory, Pat Hetherman feels that the BSCC night-run champion 1996, Debbie Davis, could be the first female to win the club night run championship.

It was in 1993 that Debbie took her first steps in Motor Sport so to speak. Having met Tony Slattery, she began to ride in the navigator's seat in historic events. Progress was made through '94 and '95 both in night runs and Historic events. On many occasions, they were lost and Debbie became a bit annoyed at that.

So in 1996, the big decision was taken. Tony moved over into the navigator's seat and Debbie took up the driving.

The speed stripes on the Austin 1800 (Land Crab)

were to be seen as a lucky token and Debbie became the best of the drivers in the club at night runs. Debbie is the first to admit that Tony is the best navigator in that union.

Apart from winning the 1996 night run series, Debbie's career highlight to date would be her first historic win, the Range Rally in 1995. In that event, Tony drove and Debbie called the shots.

At the other end of the scale, the biggest downer was when she could not compete in the Twilight as Tony helped the director with the course and that precluded her from the event.

Debbie likes the sport, as you get out to meet all sorts of people and go places you would normally never set eyes on. That is very satisfying. That is the nature of the sport.

A word of advice from our first lady of night runs: "make sure that you build team spirit within the car. Don't argue." These are wise words from Debbie. In the map reading type of event, the pressure on the navigator is enough without the driver adding to it by driving too fast for the navigator or arguing.

Debbie's next goal is to compete in the two-day gem, the Mountain Classic, which kicks off in Sydney. We all wish her luck and will cover that story.

So far this year, she has had to miss the first historic event as she works on a Saturday. Never mind, we look forward to seeing Debbie at the wheel of the 'new' Cortina, which was the outright winning car in the Motor Show Classic.

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# SAFARI COMES TO QLD

Brisbane, March 11: Queensland was back on the world events calendar with the announcement that the State will be the home base for the FIA World Cup Australian Safari for the next six years, Premier Rob Borbidge said today.

The Premier said securing the Australian leg of the FIA World Cup Safari would bring the State extensive international coverage and generate tourism dollars right across Queensland.

"This is a major coup for Queensland. We've beaten off the combined efforts of Victoria and South Australia to win this event and proved that Queensland is well and truly the best location for a broader range of events than any other State," Mr Borbidge said.

The 1997 Safari will be held in Queensland in August.

Bruce Davidson, the Minister responsible for major events, said the FIA World Cup Australian Safari would showcase Queensland's two major coastal destinations as well as outback and rural attractions to millions of television viewers across 33 countries the Americas, USA, Asia and Europe.

"The exact route is yet to be finalised but will most likely travel from Cairns, through the Tropical North into the Northern Territory then back across the border into Western Queensland, through the Channel Country, across the Great Divide and end on the Gold Coast," he said.

"Its a 7,500km, 12 day moving postcard of some of the most spectacular and diverse landscape in the world."

"The tourism link is absolutely vital. Queensland is fortunate to be in the position that we have a number of major centres with extremely diverse natural and manmade attractions around which we can base events.

"The emphasis must be on using the event as a drawcard to bring people to the region.

"Unless you have something else to offer them, you may not be able to generate repeat visitation."

Mr Borbidge said the FIA World Cup Australian Safari would directly inject nearly \$15 million dollars into Cairns, the Gold Coast and numerous outback and rural communities.

"Around 300 participants, organisers and media will travel the route accompanied along the way by as many as 2000 international visitors," he said.

"I have no doubt we will also see significant numbers of locals and visitors from interstate travelling to the more accessible parts of the Safari to catch a glimpse of what is a very exciting and entertaining event."

Mr Davidson said the event would be particularly useful in the push to identify Queensland as a world class adventure tourism destination.

"In Europe and the United States, for example, there are very significant markets for adventure tourism. There are few places left in the world which can be truly classified as wild or untamed. Queensland offers probably one of the last frontiers for this sort of tourism.
