President's Message

Hi Everyone,

While we had the disappointment of the cancellation of the Roo Systems Manumbar Rally in August due to COVID restrictions, the Globe Roamer II Imbil Rally due to take place on September 11 is still looking good to go. Mal Bartolo and his team has done a great job in preparing the event and I see there are over 40 entries. It is encouraging for this many entrants come out and run in this QRC event in these discouraging times so I hope everyone is looking forward to the rally.

On a sad note, this will be the last competitive event for the BSCC in 2021. The annual Off-Road event has not been able to be run this year, mainly due to those who have managed the event in recent years have not, this year, been able to do so. The BSCC has a strong Off-Road Racing representation in the membership so it is a shame this part of our community will miss out.

The board of the BSCC is currently working through the event calendar for 2022. As usual, there are many challenges and for next year we are concentrating our rally efforts within a six and a bit month time frame starting in late February and finishing our rally events by early September. The reason for this is to avoid the rainy season early in the year and the fire season late in the year. Time has been allowed for Off-Road as well outside that period. A draft is under consideration at the moment and I look forward to soon being in a position to announce its finalisation and we can all get on with preparations.

During the year, the BSCC has been gradually been building its equipment capability. Craig Porter has been managing some added radios and well as overseeing the Communication trailer which will house a repeater and extend our range. Ian Menzies has also been very generous with his time and contributions so thanks to lan as well. At Benarkin, we trialed out new wireless TAG timing beams and I am told they worked a treat. Andrew Dillon has prepared set-up instructions for crews to set these up in very simple and easy to read (with pics) steps. We are trialing that work as well at Imbil before making into a weather proof version. Thanks Andrew.

Imbil, 11th September 2021

Round 3 of the Queensland Rally Championship is coming together well.

With the cancellation of Manumbar, the pressure is on to ensure that the Brisbane Sporting Car Club get another event under way and completed in 2021.

The KCF event in Benarkin proved that there are keen competitors out there willing to test their skills and the Imbil event is certainly proving that with multiple entries coming in.

We must acknowledge, with gratitude, the generous sponsorship offer made by the guys from Globe Roamer, Chris Gabriel & Marcus Bark, in backing our event and helping contribute to the events success. On event day, you'll see the mighty orange Globe Roamer Unimog at the service park and with time permitting, they will be doing a lap of the stages in the middle of the day "to keep officials and spectators amused and awake".



Entries are open and the usual flurry before Close of Entries is happening, as expected, with entries around the 40 mark as I write this report. I'm not expecting to reach our cap of 50 but we are edging closer by the day.

I'd like to introduce our newly qualified Deputy Clerk of Course, Adrian Clarke who recently completed his certification as Bronze Event Command and is moving nicely into the role of event leadership. I look forward to seeing Adrian step up and take the reins as Clerk of Course one day soon. Adrain has been a huge help with the planning and preparing of Briefings etc. Thanks also goes to the super busy Kevin Lefever who is playing a dual role as COVID Checker and Officials Coordinator. And I should not forget to mention my wife and Event Secretary Gwen, who is tirelessly doing a great job of getting the event organised from an admin point of view, with much appreciated help from Marg Mackay. Of course, there is the greater team who are all working to ensure this event is great, Thank you.

The big change to this year's event is our Service Park location. With the change of dates due to a supplier not being able to service our event, the 11th September 2021 was already booked at the Imbil Showgrounds so we needed to reach out for a new venue. We have previously noted that the Stirling Crossing Equestrian Complex could be a great venue, but never thought a horse endurance property would consider noisy rally cars. I was wrong and the Owner has welcomed us warmly. Of course, it is private property and it is a horse stud, so we do need to respect their request to look after the property.



So far, those on the Organising Team have been left in awe, after paying the venue a visit. With 17 bays undercover, more space than you can imagine and Amenities that are just beyond belief, we do hope that you will all appreciate what we have available (the amenities block is luxurious AND AIR CONDITIONED).

Next on the agenda was catering. Thankfully we have the Mary Valley Show Society still keen to do the catering on Saturday and will be catering from 6:00am through to close of business at the end of day. We've also organised a Coffee Van to come along and serve coffee and small cakes. There is Jungle Pizza mobile pizza oven coming with pizza's cooked in a jiffy on Friday evening and Saturday and they have a friend coming along to offer smoothies and milkshakes. So, with all of this available, hopefully a stay at the SCEC grounds will be more than satisfying.

Lastly, the stages!!! As we approach the fire season, HQ Plantations have prepared a number of roads to ensure access is good, and while we didn't ask, many of the roads being used for the event seem to have been graded. There was also a section that we (BSCC) have paid to be fixed and so, the roads in general are in great shape though dusty (hopefully todays rainfall will help settle that).

With the ever-increasing restrictions being imposed by HQP, the event is running on roads used before, however we've brought back small sections of road not used in some years after the decline of the APRC events. We've also changed direction on a couple, so that the competitors won't find the event "boring" and "we did that last year". We then finish off with SS2 (Casey's Gully) being joined with the tail end of SS1 (Big Dadda) to become SS9 (The Dam) and give competitors that final run in the dark. Don't be

complacent because we've thrown in further changes to keep navigators on their toes. And drivers, don't follow the obvious marks in the road on the last run, we might not be going that way in the final stage.

Our respect goes out to the families of Errol Bailey and Keith Mackay who have allowed us to name two of the stages in honour of them and the legacy they have left behind. Big Dadda & Macca.

Lastly, we are still short of Officials. So, if you can help or know someone who can help, please get them to get in touch, as we still have a number of vacancies that need to be filled.

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


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


With many new club members joining the ranks it would be great to hear your story and what motorsport your involved in.
